# Blessed Anna Kolesarova: Finding Inspiration in Tragedy

In a stadium today in the eastern Slovakia city of Kosice, a young woman who was martyred in 1944 is being beatified. Tomorrow, Anna Kolesarova's relics will be transferred to St. Elisabeth Cathedral, pictured here. Anna was only sixteen when Soviet soldiers entered the village where the family lived. They



and their neighbors hid in a cellar in hopes of going unnoticed, but were unsuccessful. Anna was instructed to get food for one of the soldiers, and the man then shot her to death when she refused to have sex with him.


